"Gib must lobby Britain"

"Gibraltar has to sell itself as no one else is going to do the job for the Gibraltarians."

He thinks that the Gibraltar Government should organise teach-ins at Westminster as this would be the easiest and most cost effective way of increasing the membership of the Gibraltar Parliamentary Group. Perhaps consideration should be given to making this presentation an all party affair to demonstrate the consensus voice of Gibraltar politics.

Although there are several Gibraltarians in his constituency they remain anonymous and have yet to lobby him.

Gibraltarians should send weekly reports to members of the lobby about the delays at the frontier. Without up to date information the Parliamentary Lobby can do very little; with information the existing members will be able to interest other Members of Parliament about the continuing Gibraltar problem. The lack of interest falls fairly and squarely on the lack of action taken on the Rock. This must be remedied at once.

The Member for Ealing's final remarks were on Gibraltar's constitutional future. For some unknown reason the Chief Minister had not responded publicly to the Foreign Secretary's invitation to submit ideas about updating the 1969 Constitution. Greenway has an open mind on the next stage and

feels that there should be public debate in Gibraltar. As no political party has briefed him he is not aware of the alternative views being propounded on the Rock.

Harry Greenway, 61, was elected Conservative Member of Parliament for Ealing North in the election of 1979. he was educated at Warwick School; the College of St Mark and St John, London and the University of Caen, Normandy. he joined the Conservative Party, aged 14, and at this early age set his heart on becoming an M.P.

He contested without success Stepney in the 1970 election and Stepney and Poplar in the 1974 election. In 1979 his perseverance was rewarded when he captured Ealing North from Bill Molloy (now the Labour Life Peer Lord Molloy who is a Member of the Parliamentary Lobby.)

Greenway decided that his vocation lay in teaching and taught at Millbank School, 1957-60. He moved to deputy head of Sir William Collins School, 1960-72 and then as deputy headmaster of Sedgehill School which is a giant comprehensive of some 2000 pupils, 1972-79. In 1965 he was a Members of the Conservative National Advisory Committee on education and was chairman of the Greater London Area Advisory Committee on

Education, 1970-73, chairman of the Atlantic Education Committee, 1979-84, member of the Select Committee on Education, Science and Arts 1979-92, Council of the Open University 1980, a former Trustee of St Clare's College, Oxford and Hon Secretary of the Conservative Parliamentary Education Committee 1981-83.

One of his passions is to improve relations between Arabs and Israelis and is an active member of the Conservative Middle East Council and the Conservative Friends of Israel. He visited Jordan and the West Bank in 1990 at the invitation of the Bow Group. he also led an all Party delegation to Sri Lanka.

Greenway is a Freeman of the City of London and a liveryman of the Worshipful Company of Farriers. His four special interests are horses, free trade, freedom of the individual and women's issues.
